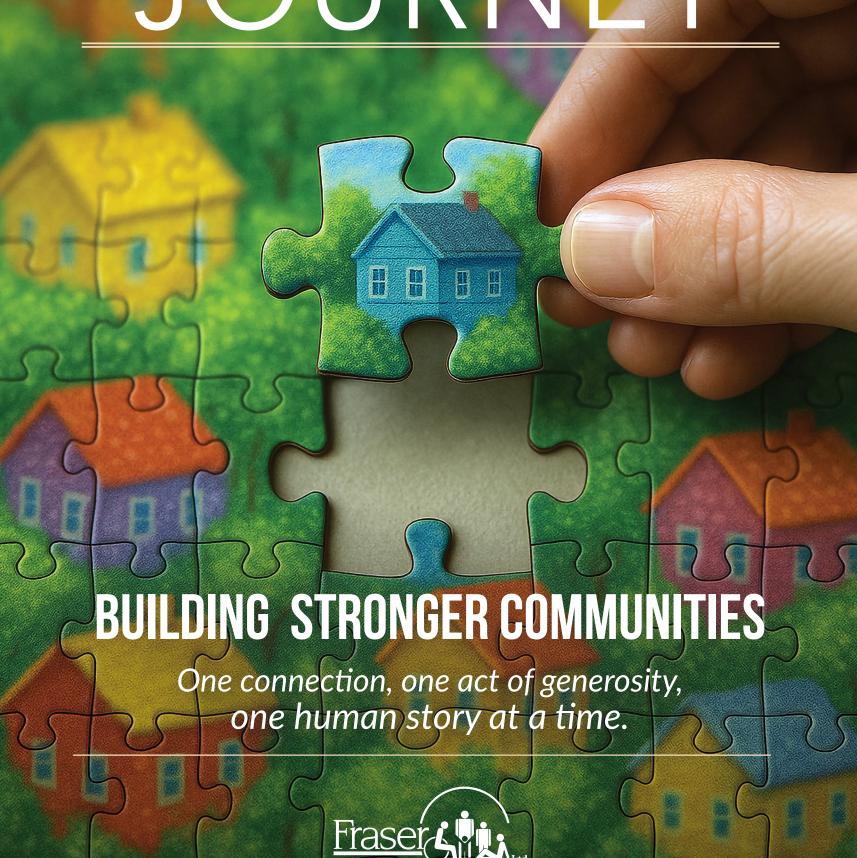

This work continues because people continue to care. And in a world where compassion sometimes feels in short supply, that's something worth celebrating.

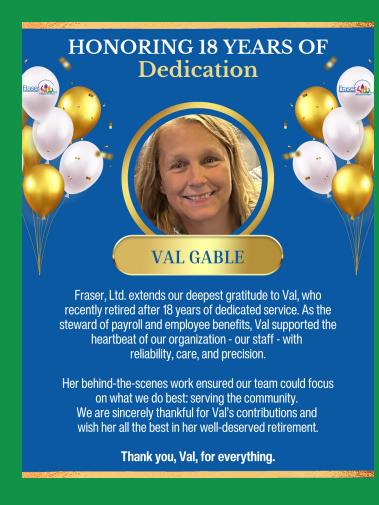
